If you are legally entitled to work in Canada, you are protected by law.

Health and Safety

- You have the right to refuse unsafe work
- You have the right to job training
- You have the right to a workplace free of harassment and discrimination

Wages and Work Hours

- A standard full-time work week is 40 hours
- Any wage deductions (such as for housing) must be clearly stated in your written contract

Paid Time Off

- You have the right to take paid leave for:
- Sick Leave or Family Leave
- Pregnancy or Parental Leave
- Death in the Family (Bereivement)
- Family Violence

Workplace Protection

- Discrimination and Harassment are not allowed
- Sexual Harassment is illegal
- You have the right to report mistreatment or abuse (temporary foreign workers may do so through an Open Work Permit for Vulnerable Workers at www.canada.ca/vulnerable-workers)

YOUR RIGHTS & RESPONSIBILITIES AS A FAMILY, SPOUSE, OR PARTNER



Family law in Canada includes:

Divorce or separation
Custody of your child or children
Visitation or access rights
Financial support from the other parent

Family Violence is a Crime in Canada.

Family violence includes:

Physical abuse (hitting, slapping, kicking, pushing, etc.)
Threats, confinement, or use of weapons
Controlling behavior (not letting your partner work, have money, friends, or medical care)
Sexual abuse (any unwanted sexual contact is illegal, even if you are married or in a relationship)

A child can be taken from a home if they are at risk of harm.

If You Are Experiencing Family Violence:

You have the right to end your rental agreement early. Apply to the Director of Residential Tenancies You must give 30 days' notice.

You also have the right to:

Ask for an interpreter

Speak to a lawyer

Bring a support person to legal appointments

Have translated documents notarized by a lawyer



YOUR RIGHTS & RESPONSIBILITIES WHEN RENTING





As a Renter, You Must:

Pay your rent on time
Keep your unit clean and repair any damage you cause
Not change locks or disconnect heat, water, or electricity
Notify your landlord in writing if you plan to move out
Follow the terms in your rental agreement related to moving out
Respect building rules and live peacefully with neighbours

Your Landlord Can:

Not enter your unit without notice, except in an emergency
Provide at least 24 hours' written notice before entering
Not raise your rent without proper written notice
Not increase rent during a fixed-term lease
Not shut off heat, water, or electricity
Return your security deposit within 10 days after your lease ends
Charge a late fee if rent is overdue
Evict you if rent is unpaid for:
3 days (weekly lease)

5 days (monthly or fixed-term lease)

You have the right to bring a support person or translator to help you understand and review your rental agreement before signing.
